

Global Consultation for the Commemoration of the 20th anniversary of the Decade of the Churches in Solidarity with Women

Annotated Agenda

Objective

In the context of the 70th anniversary of the World Council of Churches (WCC),, the pilgrimage of justice and peace and the 2030 sustainable development agenda, the main objective of the 2018 commemoration of the 20th anniversary of the Decade of the Churches in Solidarity with Women is for: *member churches and ecumenical partners, in an intergenerational setting, to reflect on the achievements and challenges in building a just community of women and men and to strengthen ecumenical collaboration in reading the signs of our times in order to map the future direction of our work.*

Expected outcome

Shared ecumenical reading and interpretation of signs of our times for moving towards a just community of women and men in the church and society and a vision statement.

Activities

In light of this objective, the consultation will focus its activities around three areas, namely:

- 1. Celebrate our gifts, visit the wounds and transform injustices in the relationships between women and men in the church since 1998;
- 2. Throughout the consultation to highlight the four priority topics for the decade:
 - violence against women in its various forms,
 - women's full and creative participation in the life of the church,
 - the global economic crisis and its effect on women, and
 - racism and xenophobia and their specific impact on women.
- 3. Take stock of how the Thursdays in Black has spread to member churches and the wider society; analyse how the Thursdays in Black campaign intersects with gender justice advocacy and the 2030 agenda, and recommit to our active solidarity through the campaign;
- 4. Develop a vision statement for furthering conversations to build intergenerational just communities of women and men among: (a) church leaders, (b) church groups, (c) theological networks (d) ecumenical leaders and (e) women and youth on the margins of the church and society and (f) from churches which are on the margins.

Framework Agenda

The agenda has main building blocks (Community Building, Spiritual Life, Framing the issues, Celebrating the gifts, Visiting the wounds, and Transforming injustices) all of which are an integral part of the celebration and together contribute to reaching the objectives. Your participation is desired throughout all sessions.

How to prepare for the consultation

These are guidelines to help you prepare yourself for the Global Consultation for the Commemoration of the 20th anniversary of the Decade of the Churches in Solidarity with Women:

- 1. Be ready to share, connect and network with participants
- 2. Your active participation and interaction makes the consultation better
- 3. Bring materials for display from your church or organisation
- 4. Bring a small basket which can fit either in your checked in or your hand luggage
- 5. Bring a strip of cloth to weave into a basket

Methodological elements

Role of session intergenerational moderators

The moderators of the session are responsible for ensuring direction, flow, timing of the session, and inviting participants to speak. Clear direction to the "park attendant" is helpful for issues to be dealt with in upcoming sessions. The moderators will also call upon the listeners to summarize the session at its end.

Role of Listeners:

8 listeners from amongst the participants will be identified prior to the conversation. They will be called to summarize what they have heard after each session. By Friday 5th Friday, they will be asked to present a) a first draft of consultation report b) a first draft of a vision statement based on the discussions of the past three days.

Guiding questions for daily checking:

- What have you heard today?
- What are main points you would like to highlight for each day?
- How do you feel this is connecting with what we have heard previously?
- What needs more time to discuss?
- What is missing?
- What should go to the vision statement?

Role of "park attendant"

One park attendant will be identified amongst the participants per day with the specific role to note on a flipchart issues, questions and comments that need to be addressed in other sessions.

Spiritual Life

The spiritual life of the Global Consultation is formed by common prayers and bible studies in the morning and a symbolic ritual in the evening. The bible readings used in the morning will serve as reference for the symbolic rituals in the evening.

A basket (or baskets) and cloth will be the main symbolic elements of the spiritual life. They will become the "liturgical center" or "symbolic center" of the Consultation carried throughout the whole Spiritual life of the Global Consultation.
